As we approach the end of term, it is with great pleasure that I can report back to you on the progress that your sons and daughters have made during this term. As always there have been some notable improvements in many areas. One particular area that we have targeted and seen real improvements in is writing. You will no doubt have heard comments from your children talking about Mr Van's car (Stranded on the roundabout), or having to write a piece persuading a mystery guest, that all pupils really should be able to use iPads for their learning. Therefore the Big Idea (a series of thought provoking mini projects), alongside the use of Pobble really has had an impact on quality and quantity of writing. As always, we will be reviewing all of the above, as we approach the end of the summer term.

Please note the following staffing changes as we approach the end of this term and start next term. Following local advertisement and interview process, Jade Maranian (Currently 'Miss Jade' in the front office) will be staying with us, but working as a Learning and Support Assistant next term. We have advertised for her replacement, and will interview for the Office role on the penultimate day of term, so I will let you know who is appointed in due course. We also have a new Learning and Support Assistant starting with us after Easter. Therefore, we will all officially welcome Miss Kara Jarvis in April.

I have already written to you all informing you that Mrs Kimpton, my current Deputy Headteacher, and long standing member of Larwood School is retiring at the end of the summer term. As always, we will celebrate her dedication to Larwood during the summer term with all concerned and we have interviewed for her replacement. After a national advertising campaign, rigorous short listing, and a selection process involving 13 members of staff and approximately 30 pupils, Mr Van De Merwe was appointed.

Finally, for this term, our residential Ofsted inspection took place on 28th Feb until the 2nd March, and has left us with a glowing report! As this is our second year achieving 'outstanding' grades in all areas of the inspection, we are delighted that the inspection team of Trish Palmer and Jensy Kelly, were able to match our own self evaluation with what they saw via the process. A fuller description of the report will be shared with you during the summer term but the following comments really do great justice to our team of pupils, staff and governors:

- The children are treated with dignity and respect, and are taught to respect each other. They are encouraged to help and support each other with independence and daily living.
- Children are given the opportunity to experience new activities, have fun and to thrive in a safe and nurturing environment. Staff are not risk averse and they want the children to have the same positive experiences as their peers.
- The children make excellent progress because of the residential provision. They have improved their behaviours and they have developed their social and independence skills

All of the above is only possible by having such a dedicated and committed team of staff that really do care, go the extra mile and look for every opportunity to help your children make progress. It is also why I am immensely proud to be the Headteacher of such a school! Enjoy the Easter break and hopefully we will continue to see some sunshine. We return to school on TUESDAY 18TH APRIL at the usual time.

Trae-Jhuan producing some art


















Mrs Williams' Class



During Science we have been learning about materials, their properties and how we separate different materials. We had great fun separating out the different materials from Mrs Williams' special mixture!

In Mrs Williams' class we have been learning about Performance Poetry. We studied a variety of poems and looked at how different people performed them. We then worked in small groups to create a performance. Everyone had to recite part of the poem and some people created actions to go with it. We concentrated on using our voices, facial expressions and our bodies to make our performances amazing.

Mr Scales' Class

As mentioned in the previous issue of the lowdown, we have been studying the Ancient Egyptians. As our knowledge of the Egyptians has progressed so the number of projects we have undertaken. The class have worked in pairs to utilise their mathematics shape knowledge to create square-based pyramids, which now

house mummified apples. The scientific mummification process proved to be a success and very interesting as the apples completely dried out and shrunk down in size due to the Bicarbonate of Soda and salt mix created by the children. Furthermore, we recreated the infamous step pyramid using sugar cubes (each cube representing the sandstone blocks). In addition to this, each member of the class produced PowerPoint presentations and presented them in an interactive manner, sharing their knowledge confidently. To conclude our topic we are currently finalising our fact files.





Miss Trott's Class we have been learning about formal arguments. The boys prepared an argument about whether children should choose what they learn in school. They did an amazing job holding the debate and presenting their arguments. Although both sides put forward some excellent points, it was the 'against' side that came out as the winner.




Mrs Poles class we have continued

to enjoy finding out about Ancient Egyptians. We have enjoyed mummifying tomatoes and making canopic jars to understand how the Egyptians prepared their dead for the afterlife as well as building Lego pyramids and modelling Sphinxes.



In Science, we have learnt how to classify plants, animals and sweets!



The children also produced some beautiful artwork of Thomas Telford's bridges as part of our British Values display for the school hall. The staff were so impressed with the detail and effort the pupils put in.



Government legislation introduced in 2014 led to an increased emphasis on promoting British values to all pupils, as part of our spiritual, moral, social and cultural development program. Having placed a strong emphasis on moral values and being a responsible member of the Larwood school community, we had already established a strong base in this area. During the 2014-15, we have reviewed where we believe our strength and weaknesses are within this program and this has helped to clarify what we need to do next, alongside what we need to continue to maintain. Such provision may be via the formal curriculum or via more informal opportunities such as play, lunchtimes, additional events including charity based days and trips and visits.

How we do this, what are our strengths and what needs more development?

Influencing decisions making through democratic processes.

This is promoted via the school structure that enables pupils to have a voice and make choices as part of the day to running of the school, as well as long term change and decisions that may affect them. We do this by:

- Promoting class debate around subjects and choices
- Electing school council members and having pupils speak to members of the Leadership Team/Chair of the Governing Body about ideas and choices
- Pupil opinion is sought regularly and in a variety of ways.
 This includes how they are taught, what food is available, play equipment, where trips may go to and how they are helped to improve their work and behaviour
- The school curriculum looks at how some people and countries replicate our beliefs and how some don't

We know that we need to continue to develop the idea that although many aspects of change can be managed via opinion, sometimes, a decision has to be made on the evidence available and that lots of people may have differing opinions. This can cause anxiety and confusion during periods of change.

The law and how this protects people, with clear reference to well being and safety

We make it clear that there are laws (rules) that work at school, in the community and across the country. Alongside these there are also consequences and rewards. Again this is embedded via our day to day interactions, as well as assemblies, PSHE, and curriculum. We promote this by:

 Having clear behaviour management policies for staff/ parents etc. and ensuring that pupils are clear about our rules and sanctions. The behaviour ladders and reward ladders are displayed throughout the school and referred to regularly.

- Assemblies promote and remind pupils about such values and our points system and consequences are applied fairly and consistently.
- We have an excellent relationship with our local Police and Fire service colleagues. They visit to speak to pupils both during the day and in boarding about general and specific issues.
- The curriculum enhances reference to laws where relevant and helps pupils to understand the rules that they have to follow whilst not at school.

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Individual liberty and mutual respect

This is closely related to law and our ethos and values are driven by the idea of mutual respect that allows us to have the freedom of choice when following rules and laws. We do this by:

- Promotion of rules and laws alongside consequences, that allow schools, communities, families and countries to work, play and enjoy various environments.
- Actions have consequences. Assemblies, lessons, play.
 Trips and everything that we do is underpinned by a points system that is supported by a culture of working together to get things right.
- Making the right choice can be difficult but rewarding in many ways.

We will maintain our day to day interaction with pupils to reinforce the idea that all people should be respected, that laws are there to serve us all and we all have the right to be safe.

Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs

As our intake varies greatly, both during the year, and from year to year, we ensure that curriculum provision, assemblies, PSHE and a range of activities support and extend knowledge and understanding this area. Views are discussed from a historical (For example, World War 2) and topical context. Where views are expressed that need deeper discussion, they take place with support and guidance and visits are arranged to different faiths that help to break down perceived barriers and perceptions. We continue to be very aware of perceptions that exist with regards to different cultures that may not be particularly prevalent

gards to different cultures that may not be particularly prevalent within the Stevenage and North Herts area, as well as maintaining a close eye of the political climate and some view that may be generated via such debates.
