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Life at Larwood as a Governor - Mr Thurgood



I am Vice Chair of Governors and Chair of the Finance and Personnel sub- committee, which provides "Critical Friend" support to the Senior Management Team on these issues. One of the key issues is signing off on the school budget in April of each year and then monitoring the performance over the financial year to ensure that we achieve best value for the money the school spends.

I retired early after working for the railways for 37 years in mainly finance roles, finishing my career as a Senior Business Analyst –helping to manage financial data flows between BR/

Government. Once I retired, I was immediately recruited to serve on the Governing Body, where I am now in my 15^{th} year.

All Governors are linked to a class group and are invited to visit by the teacher during the year. This is one of the few times that Governors get to see the pupils in their working environment.

I enjoy working with the children and you will usually find me working in the kitchen garden on Friday afternoons, during the spring, and summer helping staff to provide support and guidance to those children who choose gardening as their Friday reward.

It is a very rewarding use of my leisure time.

<u>As part of our School Rewards</u> system we are introducing an end of term trip. Each term there will be three possible trips pupils can access. 'Off points' pupils will have a choice as to which trip they would like to go on, the other pupils are given a trip based on the following criteria:

Level 1 Trip - Pupils will access the level one trip if they have had less than fifteen restraints and recorded incidents of violent behaviour, have not left supervision more than 20 times and who's attendance at school is suitable

Level 2 Trip – To access this trip pupils cannot have had more than one physical restraint or exclusion, they must have less than 15 recorded incidents against their name, must not have left supervision more than 10 times and their attendance must be at least 92%

Level 3 Trip – This trip is the most prestigious. Pupils must not have been involved in any physical restraints or exclusions, they must have less than 5 recorded incidents against their name, must not have left supervision and must have attendance of 95% or above.

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
