NEW BEGUNNUNGS

I hope that this first newsletter of the new academic year finds you and your family looking forward to the half term break. Incredibly, we have already reached half term! You will find in this edition lots of updates of events that have taken place during the half term. The nature of any school is that there is always lots of things going on, but this year, due to some governmental change, there has been even more to deal with than usual! This includes:

A new curriculum:

We began work on this last year and some pupils have now started to access and use this. We maintain our provision of teaching literacy and numeracy during the mornings, with other subjects (for example, Science, Geography and History) being delivered in the afternoons. Thursday afternoons still continue with our skills curriculum and Friday afternoons remain the same with our reward programme.

Assessment:

As part of the government's change to assessing primary aged pupils, they will no longer be given a level (with the exception of current Year 6). We will now start to record their progress and report to you with some reference to if they are working at/ below / above age related standards. Both the new curriculum and assessment methods have made things harder and more challenging. For example, in some areas of the curriculum, work that would've been completed in Year 5 is now part of Year 4! More information will follow with this as the year progresses.

Hertfordshire Steps:

As mentioned last year, we have now trained staff and implemented this Hertfordshire behavior management process. I have organised one information session for parents (Tuesday 21st October) and there will be some more in due course.

Summer Projects:

During the summer, Mr. Miles, his team and other contractors made a number of changes to the site including a new outdoor classroom being built; new fencing to add to existing school security; the main hall has been plastered, decorated and has new display boards and we now have an outdoor story telling area.

The annual year six fishing trip takes place at the Rib Valley Fishing Lakes which comprises of three still-water lakes; Rib Lake, Millennium Lake, and Westmill Lake. The three lakes are situated in the picturesque Rib Valley immediately adjacent to the River Rib at Ware in Hertfordshire.

The children spent the day Trout and Coarse fishing. On arrival the children were teamed up with a professional angler from the Masons and were then taught how to fly and coarse fish.

Fly fishing is an angling method in which an artificial 'fly' is used to catch fish. The fly is cast using a fly rod, reel, and specialised weighted line. Casting a nearly weightless fly or 'lure' requires casting techniques significantly different from other forms of casting. Fly fishermen use hand tied flies that resemble natural invertebrates or other food organisms, or 'lures' to provoke the fish to strike.

Coarse fishing is a term used in the United Kingdom and Ireland for angling for coarse fish, which are types of freshwater fish other than game fish (trout, salmon and char). The sport and the techniques used are particularly popular in the United Kingdom and mainland Europe.

The children had an enjoyable day. The children caught lots of fish whilst coarse fishing and all were put back. A special mention to Finlay who caught 39 fish! Kiar for being so very patient when his fly line got caught in the weeds, Chris and Ryan for eating more burgers than anyone else! Some of the children had a go at Trout fishing but despite the lake being topped up with fish whilst we were there, the Rainbow Trout knew we were there and didn't bite so no fish for supper.

Thank you to the organisers at Rib Valley and to the Masons for taking time out of their work life to support our children, see you next year!
