The Arts Award pupils in Year 6 continue to make good progress and PE lessons have continued. Music is an everyday, essential part of life at Larwood delivered during lessons, at playtimes and during assemblies.

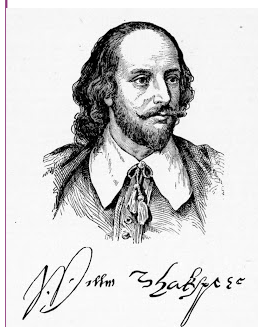
Class Work

FACT: Shakespeare had 7 siblings: Joan, Margaret, Gilbert, Joan II, Anne, Richard and Edmund.

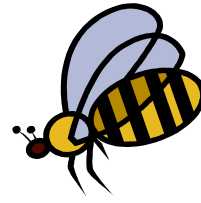
FACT: Almost 400 years after his death there are 157 million pages referring to him on google.

- ◆ There are examples of individual pupils making outstanding progress.

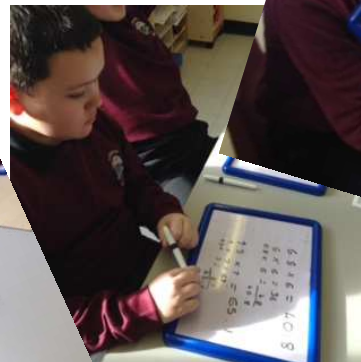

Sits in a bin.

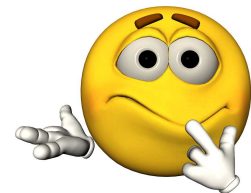
