BACK TO THE FUTURE

The start of 2016 has already been noted for the rapid pace of change at Larwood. We have welcomed a small number of pupils and some new staff. Our revised Senior Leadership Team has been reviewing some key areas of our school policy and practice. This has included how we allocate points to pupils, our House system, improving attendance, and how we admit and transfer pupils to and from Larwood. However, we can't keep pace with the number of storms we seem to be

experiencing and 'Imogen' is currently making an impression as I write these notes. Having said that so did Abigail, Barney, Clodagh (Clo-da), Desmond, Eva, Frank, Gertrude and Henry!

As part of our schools future development, the governing body, alongside the staff have reviewed our current school status (Foundation) and how things may change during the next few years. You may be aware that as part of the current government's election manifesto, they have made it clear that 'Free' Schools and Academies would be encouraged during their tenure. As part of this process, the governing body have decided to start the process of consultation related to Larwood School becoming an Academy. There has been extensive discussion on this matter as it will equate to a lot more work during the next few months. However, at this stage the perceived benefits of such a move are as follows:

- An increased level of autonomy with regards to the future direction of the school
- A natural step for us having already become a Foundation school
- Greater responsibility in ensuring the best, and most financially efficient ways of securing services to the school
- We would be an independent, state funded school rather than a local authority funded school
- There is greater freedom with regards to the curriculum and its application
- In a similar way to having Foundation Status, the Governing Body will continue to be the employer, and have responsibility for health and safety
- You can become your own admissions authority, however, this is not something that the governing body are considering at this point; and
- The ability to strengthen our work within Stevenage and the wider locality for pupils and other schools that may benefit from it

I think that the main question every parent would probably want to ask is 'how will this affect my child's education?' In short, they would not really notice the difference as much of the above would not be seen by them. However, they may, in due course experience an adjusted curriculum and/or benefit from savings made in the securing of services usually bought from the Local Authority. One thing should be a constant in all of this process and that is that the quality of education provided to your child remains excellent. Please note that a separate letter relating to this matter will follow and there will be an opportunity to ask any questions you have on the matter in a variety of ways.

In the meantime, let's hope we do not see storm Jack!



FORENSIC SCIENCE




build Lego models.

Pupils have good opportunities to develop a range of skills, including through attending vocational taster sessions at North Herts College and working with visiting artists and musicians as part of the Trinity Guildhall Bronze Arts Award. These stimulating activities contribute to pupils' positive attitudes to learning and to their overall achievement.

Pupils make good progress in developing their physical and sporting skills. Outdoor education contributes considerably to this and those pupils who successfully complete this course have the opportunity to climb Snowdon at the end of the school year.

The quality of teaching has improved since the previous inspection and is now good at both key stages, including in English and mathematics.

Teachers have good relationships with their pupils, classrooms are made attractive with displays and lessons are purposeful.

In many lessons, teachers question pupils well to check their understanding and deepen their thinking.

Pupils have regular reading and spelling tasks for homework, and the teaching of reading is good throughout the school.

Teachers provide pupils with plenty of opportunity to practise their reading in class and in an outstanding English lesson in Years 2 and 3, the teacher supported pupils very skilfully as they drew on their knowledge of sounds and letters to label diagrams of what they see on their way to school.





Miss Trott's Class



OUTSTANDING

Ofsted Outstanding! Yes, that's what we are!

Mr Trimble (Head Teacher) and Mr Reid (Head of Care) were not only very pleased but also proud to receive the recent Ofsted report for residential care. The report had confirmed our own self evaluation that we were now outstanding in all areas of residential care. Mr Trimble has thanked all staff for their work in this area but particularly praised the Care Team for their hard work and commitment, to provide the very best possible experience for all of our residential pupils. It was also noted that pupil voice and parent comments featured strongly in the inspection process and report itself.

A few quotes from the inspection:

Children make exceptional progress in all areas of academic and emotional development from their starting point in this school.

All children are proud of their accommodation, they are keen to share it with visitors and unanimously talk positively about their experiences. One child said: 'I want to stay here forever and ever. It is fun being here, I do not think they could do anything better.'

Staff respect individual identities, behaviours and characters; they use positive reinforcement and celebration of difference to allow children's individual personalities to shine.

The head teacher, head of care and staff form a very strong and stable staff team. They strive to deliver the highest quality care and focus development of the provision on promoting purposeful achievement for all children. The joined up school and residential management and staff teams provide effective and attuned leadership and care across the provision.

The Head teacher invests in the residential provision. He uses continuous monitoring to inform future planning and expand on positive experiences for children. Children are encouraged to access the independent visitors and all children know how to do this.

Trusting relationships develop between all children and the stable care staff team. These are characterised by consistency, understanding, and warmth. These dependable relationships provide a stable base from which all children achieve. Peer relationships are strong and staff support children to understand each other's differences. Where children have trouble in their friendships, staff allow each child time to explore their feelings and the impact of their behaviours on each other.

Creative approaches to behaviour management complement more traditional responses. Staff effectively safeguard children and carefully balance safety in a non-oppressive way to ensure that children enjoy a variety of life experiences when they begin boarding. This includes purposeful and fun activities in the community. Through these activities, children make a valid contribution to other's lives, their social skills develop along with positive feelings of self-worth. An example of this is visits to a neighbouring home for older people where children read books to the residents.

A parent said: 'My son has a fantastic opportunity here. He enjoys doing his homework and he is making really good progress. He is calmer. He is not confused, he likes the boarding routine. He likes boarding a lot and he is learning about how to look after himself. He is doing things he would not have done before.'
